So whether you're traveling to Jamaica or the Caymans, Martinique or the Bahamas you now have a place to record your observations. Here, then, you now have a way to share these observations with conservationists and ornithologists—people with an interest in birds in the Caribbean. So if you have taken a trip to this fascinating region, we ask for you to enter your bird observations. If not, consider a trip to the region where examining biogeography means watching charming tobes, toasting lizard-cuckoos, chasing hummingbirds and assortment of endemic parrots.

# Be an eBirder!

## What is eBird?

eBird is a free, online checklist program from the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and the National Audubon Society.

You can:

- ✎ Enter eBird sightings anywhere, any time
- ✎ Track your observations over time
- ✎ Learn what other eBirders are reporting
- ✎ Discover trends in your own backyard or across the continent using colorful charts and graphs

By sharing your sightings with others through eBird, you'll help conservationists gain a better understanding of birds and the habitats they require.

You'll create a lasting legacy out of your bird checklists—whether you start with today's sightings or contribute historic records by entering your checklists of yesteryear.

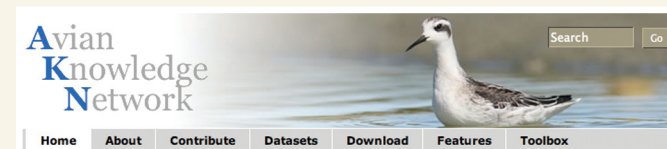

## Be Part of the Big Picture

Scientists need your help understanding the "big picture" of bird distribution and abundance and how they might be changing over time. Your information helps answer questions such as:

- ✎ Is global climate change having an impact on bird migration and breeding cycles?
- ✎ How are new diseases affecting bird populations?
- ✎ Which species are declining in number and which are expanding their ranges?



Every eBird observation becomes part of the Avian Knowledge Network, a powerful database with millions of records that scientists use to monitor bird populations.
