FRIDAY EVENING, MAY 31

KEYNOTE PRESENTATION: BIRDIE BIG YEAR – ELEVATING WOMEN BIRDERS

Tiffany Kersten is a Wisconsin native who now resides in the Rio Grande Valley of South Texas. Hooked on birds since age 12, she graduated from Northland College with

a B.S. in Wildlife Ecology. She has spent fifteen years of working in conservation and environmental education with organizations including the US Forest Service, US Fish & Wildlife Service, and the Cape May Bird Observatory. After completing a Lower 48 States Big Year in 2021, she founded her own company, Nature Ninja Birding Tours.

About her presentation

Tiffany Kersten didn't set out to do a Big Year, but after a series of unanticipated and serendipitous events, she suddenly found herself amidst one. As a sexual assault survivor, she spent 2021 traveling to all corners of the Lower 48 States, tallying birds and gifting personal safety alarms to women she met along the way. Her goal was to see 700 species, and to raise awareness of women's safety in the outdoors. She ended up surpassing her goal and setting a new record, of 726 species. In her presentation, Tiffany will lead us through the fear, empowerment, struggles, and healing that all played vital roles in the personal growth she experienced on this wild adventure.



The majority of trips are offered on both days, however, some may only be offered on Saturday or Sunday. See the Field Trip Key below for the schedule.

BLACK SANDY STATE PARK & HAUSER DAM

SatAI • Sun AI

Moderate/Difficult

This trip explores Hauser Lake and Dam. Habitats include lake, river, scattered conifers, and rocky canyon slopes. Likely birds: three species of nuthatches, Canyon Wren (a specialty), White-throated Swift, American Dipper, Belted Kingfisher, Common Merganser, Clark's Nutcracker, other conifer-associated species. The trip will stop at Black Sandy State Park for a short walk around the campground. Participants then take a short drive to Hauser Dam. A short hike (~0.5 mi) across the dam and downriver is the best chance for Canyon Wren. The trail is a bit steep and rocky as it descends to the river, and there are some scree areas to cross along the river. This is very doable for most, but does require special attention to the trail.

ELKHORN MOUNTAINS / MCCLELLAN CREEK RD.

SatA2 • SunA2

Easy

This trip explores McClelland Creek and the northern portion of the Elkhorn Mountains. It is a combination of driving and short walks along roads and trails. A visit to the Strawberry Fire Lookout is a treat where Yellow-rumped Warblers and Mountain Chickadees can be found. Initially habitat will be mostly coniferous through the Elkhorns. Grassland and agriculture dominate the lower end of the tour. Birds likely to be encountered include three species of nuthatch, several flycatcher species (including Olive-sided Flycatcher), Red Crossbill, Clark's Nutcracker, and five or six woodpecker/sapsucker species. If we're lucky a Northern Pygmy-Owl will give us a "toot"!

HILGER HEREFORD RANCH / GATES OF THE MOUNTAINS

SatA3 • SunA3

Easy+

Locally-owned Hilger Ranch abuts the Gates of the Mountains Wilderness Area along Holter Lake and the Missouri River. The ranch is under conservation easement, accessible by permission only. The trip accesses the ranch near the marina and heads along a grassland/sage/ Ponderosa bench overlooking the lake. Along with grassland regulars, we may find Pinyon Jay, Brewer's Sparrow and Lewis's Woodpecker. The dirt road continues to a lakeside riparian area, where Nashville Warbler, MacGillavray's Warbler, Blackpoll Warbler and American Redstart have been seen. The group will survey some of this riparian area on foot, and then continue upriver where limestone cliffs overlook the river. White-throated Swift and Canyon Wren are possible here. Watch for raptors overhead! Waterfowl is likely all along the river. The tour is combination driving and walking, but carpooling in 4WD vehicles is required. Hiking under 2 miles.

PHANTOM SPRINGS RANCH / LITTLE PRICKLY PEAR CREEK

SatA4 • SunA4

Moderate

This trip will follow Little Prickly Pear Creek from Phantom Springs downstream to the Sieben exit on I-15. Willows dominate the canyon, giving way to cottonwood gallery near the end. The trip will begin at Phantom Springs, a private ranch. The ranch includes a spectacular wetland, a riparian area that follows Little Prickly Pear Creek, and excellent grassland slopes with rock outcroppings. Veery, Rock Wren, Sora, Sandhill Crane and a variety of warblers are possible. The trip extends into Prickly Pear Creek Canyon which includes shrubby and coniferous uplands and limestone cliffs where one can expect Dusky Flycatcher, Spotted and Green-tailed Towhee, Lazuli Bunting and Lark Sparrow. The trip is a mix of driving and walking.

SIEBEN RANCH

SatA5 • SunA5

Moderate

The Sieben Ranch is one of the largest ranches (115,000+ acres) in Montana. The working sheep ranch is owned by the Sieben-Baucus family. The trip begins along Little Prickly Pear Creek near the Sieben exit on I-15, surveying hayfields for sparrows and Bobolink before a short hike on inactive railroad tracks along the creek. Watch for Calliope Hummingbird near the bridge! Violet-green Swallow and White-throated

Swift may be found near the canyon cliffs. The trip will then access the ranch and habitat is dominated by grassland, sage, and Pondarosa pine. Raptors, Green-tailed Towhee, and Longbilled Curlew are likely. The road meanders down into the Big Sheep Creek drainage where north-facing slopes yield to Douglas fir stands favored by Cassin's Vireo. The creek bottom is filled with warblers, thrushes, catbirds and flycatchers. Participants will walk ~2 miles roundtrip in hopes of "drumming" up Ruffed Grouse.

STEMPLE PASS RD. TO LINCOLN

SatA6 • SunA6

Easy+

This trip birds along Stemple Pass Rd, up Virginia Creek and over the Continental Divide, and into Lincoln. Willows along Canyon Creek give way to cottonwoods and aspens along Virginia Creek, and eventually conifer forests near the Continental Divide. After crossing the pass, we follow Poorman Creek, passing through cottonwood and Ponderosa pine forests into grasslands. Expect Willow, Dusky and Hammond's Flycatcher, as well as Yellow, Yellow-rumped, and MacGillivray's Warbler. In the grassy areas, Northern Harrier and Long-billed Curlew, along with Song and Lincoln's Sparrow. In the conifers watch for Western Tanager, Warbling Vireo, Cassin's Finch, Ruby-Crowned Kinglet, and Swainson's and Hermit Thrush. Brushy hillsides may offer Lazuli Bunting, Spotted Towhee and Vesper Sparrow. With luck we may spot a Pileated Woodpecker or Cassin's Vireo!

VIGILANTE CAMPGROUND / TROUT CREEK



SatA7 • SunA7

Moderate

The trip begins in the Vigilante Campground area, the go-to spot for breeding Ovenbird. The habitat is primarily Douglas fir with shrubby understory. Trout Creek offers prime riparian birding, and the trail follows the stream through towering limestone cliff faces. White-throated Swift and Violet-green Swallow nest in the cliffs. Bird species include Hammond's and Western Flycatcher, Ruffed Grouse, MacGillivray's Warbler, Veery and possibly Golden-crowned Kinglet. The hike is relatively easy with minimal elevation gain, round trip less than 2 miles. The trip ends with a visit to Vista Da Serra Ranch (a Prickly Pear Land Trust conservation easement) where hosts Tia and Derek Nelson will share views of their feeders. Expect to find several hummingbird species (Calliope, Broad-tailed, Black-chinned) as well as other mountain feeder specialties.



WARM SPRINGS PONDS COMPLEX

SatA8 • SunA8

Easy

Typically difficult to access, this trip will welcome participants to areas not generally open to the public. This trip will traverse areas of riparian, wetland, and lake/stream habitats in the Deer Lodge Valley. Bird species include a dozen or more waterfowl species, three or more grebe species, Black-crowned Night-heron, Great Blue Heron, Wilson's Snipe, Wilson's Phalarope, Osprey, Bald Eagle (nesting), Marsh Wren, Willow Flycatcher, and numerous sparrows. The trip will be mostly driving interspersed with short walks on mostly level ground.

BIRDS & BOTANY

SatA9

Easy+

This trip visits riparian zones and open sagebrush hills, focusing on resident birds and related botany. Stops include Prickly Pear Creek east of Montana City, Buffalo Creek northwest of Clancy, and nearby Sheep Mountain hillsides. Lazuli Bunting, MacGillivray's Warbler and Veery are common in the riparian areas. In 2022, the first Ovenbird recorded in Jefferson County was seen and photographed in this Lump Gulch location. We'll also identify native plants and discuss relationships between birds and plant communities. Early possible wildflowers may include - Fairy Slipper Orchid, Chocolate Lily and Purple Clematis. The field trip will end with stops at nesting boxes near Clancy. These boxes, placed by the trip leaders, have hosted Mountain & Western Bluebird, Tree Swallow and House Wren. Walking is on mostly level ground with some exploring among streamside vegetation. At Sunderland Park there is a serviceable port-a-potty, but there are no facilities at other locations. Parking is limited, carpooling strongly encouraged.

BEARTOOTH WMA



SunA9 Easy+

This trip explores one of the more scenic areas in the foothills of the Big Belt Mountains. It is an elk winter range with open, grassy hillsides, scattered conifers, heavy north-slope conifer cover, and cottonwood and willow riparian areas. The trip begins at Departure Point Campground overlooking Holter Lake. Lark Sparrow and Spotted Towhee easily found here. The trip will move into the Beartooth WMA to the Montana FWP inholding, walking trails in search of American Redstart, House Wren and Yellow-breasted Chat. Nearby cottonwoods hold Bullock's Oriole and Least Flycatcher, while grasslands should yield Lazuli Bunting, Mountain Bluebird, and several sparrow species. Watch for soaring raptors- Golden Eagle and Red-tailed Hawk likely. This trip will be a mix of driving and walking. The relatively short walking portions will be primarily on two-track roads that follow creek bottoms.

BLACKFOOT VALLEY - CUTOFF RD./ BROWN'S LAKE



SunA I 0

Easy

This tour will be one of several that will travel west of the Continental Divide. It will traverse a variety of habitats, but will focus on riparian forest along the Blackfoot River, wetland/water habitats at Brown's Lake, and shrub/ grasslands in the Blackfoot Valley. Species likely to be encountered include: Western, Red-necked, and possibly Clark's Grebes, many waterfowl species, several flycatchers, many sparrow species, including Clay-colored and Brewer's, Bullock's Oriole, Bald Eagle and other raptors, Common Yellowthroat, Eastern Kingbird, and if the weather is cloudy and cool, Vaux's Swift. Driving between several short walks, mostly on level terrain.

CANYON FERRY WMA



SunAll

Easy+

This trip will explore mostly riparian and pond habitats adjacent to the Missouri River, along with the impoundments within Canyon Ferry Wildlife Management Area. The area includes grassland, shrublands, agriculture, and cottonwood bottoms. Ponds harbor large breeding colonies of American White Pelicans and several gull species. Caspian Terns may also be present in one area, and Sandhill Cranes are common throughout. Many waterfowl species can be observed, along with grassland sparrows, swallows, orioles, and many marsh and riparian species. This route is primarily driving interspersed with short walks.

CHAIN OF LAKES - SEELEY/SWAN



SunA12

Easy

This trip begins at the Clearwater Junction (MT 200 and US 83) Rest Area, heading to Salmon Lake for a discussion about human-related impacts to nesting loons. Next stop is the Seeley Lake Ranger Station and a walk along the Clearwater Canoe Trail to the viewing blind. In early June loons may be visible if still nesting. Then the trip travels north to Summit Lake, followed by stops at various lakes on the return to the ranger station. Aside

from guaranteed views of loon families, another highlight is a heron rookery at Lake Inez. Expect many other birds of the mature coniferous forests, including Pileated Woodpecker, Steller's Jay, Townsend's and Yellow-rumped warblers, Fox and Song sparrows, Northern Waterthrush, and Willow and Hammond's flycatchers.

HEADWATERS STATE PARK / OLD TOWN RD. / CENTRAL PARK POND

SunA13

Easy

The state park at the confluence of the lefferson, Madison and Gallatin rivers, an hour drive south of Helena. The riparian forests are rich with mature cottonwood galleries, surrounded by sagebrush, buffaloberry, and grasslands. We will look for Least Flycatcher, Eastern and Western Kingbird, Bullock's Oriole, Black-headed Grosbeak and Red-tailed Hawk. Along the scenic cliffs that line the Missouri River expect to find White-throated Swift, Rock and Canyon Wren, Turkey Vulture, Osprey and possibly nesting Peregrine and/or Prairie Falcon. River species may include American White Pelican, Double-crested Cormorant and Common Merganser. Along Old Town Rd. we will search for Sage Thrasher, Western Wood-Pewee and Brewer's Sparrow.

AUSTIN ROAD / SKELLY GULCH

SatBI • SunBI

Easy

This trip follows the willow-choked valley bottom of Sevenmile Creek which is bordered by grassland. Aspen groves and coniferous forest become dominant elevationally. Riparian habitat could yield Willow Flycatcher and Northern Waterthrush, along with Veery, American Redstart, Lazuli Bunting, and Western Tanager. Driving up the east slope of the Continental Divide, we may find Swainson's and Hermit Thrush, Cassin's Vireo and Red Crossbill. Route is mostly driving with strategic stops for birding.

HELENA REGULATING RESERVOIR



SatB2 • SunB2

Moderate

This trip visits the Helena Valley Regulating Reservoir Fishing Access Site where participants will hike along the shore through meadows and dry uplands, interspersed with mature cottonwoods along the shoreline. Expect to find Western and Red-necked Grebe, Double-crested Cormorant, Spotted Sandpiper, American White Pelican and a variety of waterfowl. We will scope an established Great-blue Heron rookery which, year-to-year, hosts a Great-horned Owl nest. Least Flycatcher, Bullock's Oriole, House Wren, and Western Wood-pewee can be expected in the cottonwoods, while Savannah and Vesper Sparrow, along with Western Meadowlark, should dominate the grassland area.

LAKE HELENA WMA-CANOE/KAYAK



SatB3 • SunB3

Paddling

Limited to 10 participants. The trip will start with a short walk that will encounter shrub type passerines, including Savannah Sparrow. We will then embark in canoes/kayaks for several hours enjoying marshland, cattail, and sandbar/mudflat habitats. Expect a wide variety of waterfowl, Marsh Wren, Common Yellowthroat, Sora, Virginia Rail, White-faced Ibis, gulls and terns, possibly Black Terns and Bonaparte's Gull. Pelicans, swallows, Bald Eagle, Wilson's Snipe, and phalapropes also likely. During the first week of June (2022 & 2023), White-rumped Sandpiper, commonly a late migrant, was documented here. Please bring your own canoe/kayak and PFDs. We will try to help with these if needed.

LEWIS & CLARK COUNTY FAIRGROUNDS & SPRING MEADOW STATE PARK

SatB4 • SunB4

Easy+

This family- friendly trip on the outskirts of Helena will appeal to children and adults alike. At Spring Meadow State Park a ~0.9 mile graveled trail circles the lake, passing through cottonwoods, grassy areas and brushy thickets. At the Fairground Ponds (5-minute drive from Spring Meadow), shrubby and marshy areas surround cottonwood stands. Wood Duck is a regular here along with Bullock's Oriole, Western Wood-Pewee and Warbling Vireo, Cedar Waxwing, and Eastern Kingbird. This is a great trip to see a variety of common (and a few not so common) birds up close.

SEVENMILE CREEK

SatB5 • SunB5

Moderate

Sevenmile Creek is a private property owned by Prickly Pear Land Trust. The area is not open to the public, but LCAS has been conducting bird surveys since 2017. The property has undergone major restoration after decades of severe overgrazing. A wildfire burned much of the property in 2020, sparing some of the riparian area which is showing amazing signs of recovery. This area should produce Lazuli Bunting, Gray Catbird, Willow Flycatcher, among many others. The grasslands are the only reliable place to find Grasshopper Sparrow in the Helena Valley. Several small ponds host waterfowl, shorebirds, and a variety of swallows! Mostly level hike ~3 miles round trip, moderate due to areas of high grass (variable by year; likely not an issue).

TENMILE CREEK / MOOSE CREEK / LAZYMAN GULCH



SatB6 • SunB6

Moderate

The short hike along the Environmental Trail is through mature Douglas-fir and lodgepole pine forests, with small aspen groves mixed in. We may see Yellow-rumped Warbler, Redbreasted Nuthatch, Mountain Chickadee, Common Raven, Red-naped Sapsucker, Cassin's Finch, and Hammond's Flycatcher. Other possibilities include Cassin's Vireo and Pileated Woodpecker. The second hike is along the old railroad grade at the nearby Forest Service Campground through aspens and willows; we will look for MacGillivray's Warbler, Willow and Dusky Flycatcher, and Northern Waterthrush. The area is host to Tenmile Creek which runs along the Rimini Road. There are a couple of bridges along the creek where American Dipper may be found.

K-MART WETLANDS & NATURE PARK

SatCI • SunCI

Easy

A trip for those who would like limited walking with good bird diversity close to town. K-Mart Wetlands is a birding gem within city limits. The dirt trail is mostly level, easily navigated, ~one mile total. The retention ponds host several species of waterfowl including Wood Duck, Hooded Merganser, Blue-winged and Cinnamon Teal and possibly Red-necked Grebe. The surrounding area is filled with Yellow-rumped Warbler, Cedar Waxwing, Yellow-headed Blackbird and Song Sparrow. Nature Park, also within city limits, is another local hotspot and excellent spring migrant trap. There is a short paved trail. Eighteen warbler species have been identified here! Other species include Downy Woodpecker, Least Flycatcher, Warbling Vireo and Lazuli Bunting. Watch for late spring warblers moving through!

UPPER PRICKLY PEAR FAS & STANSFIELD LAKE



SatC2 • SunC2

Moderate

This Fishing Access Site is minutes from town, with riparian area that borders grassland and grazing land. Swallows dart along the stream while Spotted Sandpipers forage the shoreline. Excellent views of Sandhill Crane, Red-tailed Hawk, Bald Eagle, and Willow and Least Flycatcher. A variety of sparrows in the adjacent grassland. The trip also visits adjoining private property (formerly Stansfield Lake). Bullock's Oriole and Black-headed Grosbeak are common in the cottonwood-lined lane. The lane turns into a path around a wetland and pond. Yellowheaded Blackbird, Sora, Common Yellowthroat and a variety of waterfowl likely. For those looking for diversity, this field trip can produce a wide variety of birds. Plan on ~3 mile walk at both the FAS and Stansfield Lake. The ground should be mostly level, but some areas may have tallish grass that could be wet with dew.

SPRING MEADOW BIRD BANDING & LAKE TRAIL

SatC3

Easy

Hosted by Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks and Montana WILD. The trip includes a visit to the Spring Meadow Lake MAPS (Monitoring Avian Productivity and Survivorship) banding station and a guided trip around Spring Meadow Lake State Park. At the banding station, we will break into two groups, visiting the mist nets and observing the banding process. A short presentation will explain MAPS protocol and mission. Each group will also bird around the park. American Goldfinch, Gray Catbird, Black-headed Grosbeak and Yellow Warbler are regulars. The opportunity to catch a late migrant is possible. Look for Wilson's Warbler and Swainson's Thrush! Note: If the weather is uncooperative (rain. wind, cold temperatures), the session will be postponed to ensure the safety of the birds. An alternate field trip plan will be provided.


